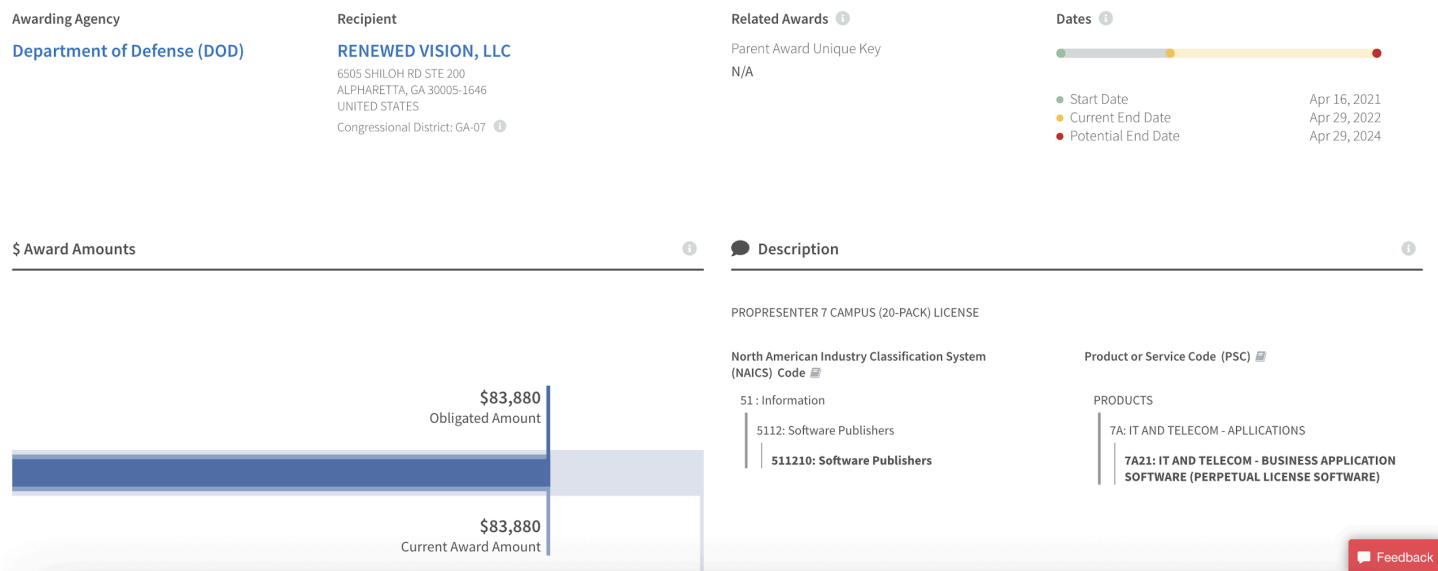

What is your stance on red flag laws in the state of Georgia?” Asked of Dolezal, Gilligan and Freeman, the first question of the night concerning ‘Red Flag Laws’ or laws that allow the removal of firearms from the possession who are deemed to be a danger to themselves or others, was met with unanimous disapproval.
